WB6IQN Roll up portable J-Pole antenna

At the July MARA meeting Dr. Edison Fong, WB6IQN of Sunnyville, California did a live Zoom presentation on the always popular J-Pole antenna. He did an excellent basic theory on how a J-Pole works and how it can be an effective VHF and VHF-UHF antenna for home or in the field.



Dr. Ed runs a side hustle business making and selling J-Pole antennas made form 300-ohm window (TVantenna) twin lead that can be configured as a roll-up for portable use or incased in PVC pipe for a fixed installation.

Ed's J-Pole intrigued several folks in attendance and considered purchasing one, especially for field portable usage.

In addition Dr. Ed said he is now offering the Chinese made uSDX QRP transceiver for sale. The little transceiver covers 80 to 10 meters, all modes. He indicated he bulk purchases them from China then installs a Li-Ion battery pack (they are shipped to the US without the battery).

He sells them for a very reasonable price.

W1ZE Note: I already own a uSDX QRP transceiver and the tiny transceiver is well made and IT WORKS. I purchased one from ALIexpress and then found a supply of 11.1 V Li-Ion batteries on Ebay. Is it a IC-7300? No but it put out a good 3 to 5 watts with an external 13.6V power source and I can make QSOs, even DX on occasion.
